City of Joondalup Population: Approximately 164,000

The City of Joondalup is a region that covers an area of 97 square kilometres from beach to bushland. The City Centre has a relaxed, casual atmosphere and is a combination of cultural, civic, commercial and residential properties built on the edge of the stunning Lake Joondalup. Residents and visitors enjoy the cosmopolitan feel and excellent selection of restaurants and cafes around the City Centre.

The City is well connected to the wider Perth Region by an integrated public transport system, including the Joondalup Train Station, Transperth Bus Services and a Central Area Transit (CAT) Service.

Major features of the City's built environment include a number of major Shopping Centres, Joondalup Resort, Arena Joondalup, Joondalup Health Campus, Edith Cowan University, West Coast Institute of Training, Western Australia Police Academy, Hillarys Boat Harbour, The Aquarium of Western Australia (AQWA), and various beaches and natural areas.

The City has a diverse range of natural areas, landscaped parks and open spaces situated within coastal, bushland and wetland environments. The Coastal Zone is one of the City's most valuable natural assets and has been recognised for its high conservation significance. This area is also greatly utilised by the local community, visitors and tourists for its recreational and aesthetic opportunities.

The City of Joondalup manages some 97 bushland areas totaling over 330 hectares of native vegetation many of which contain significant flora and fauna species and ecological communities.

The City also boasts a chain of conservation category wetlands situated within the Yellagonga Regional Park. The wetlands provide habitat for several fish, frog, reptile, bird and mammal species. The area also has significant cultural value to Indigenous Australians.

The community provides significant input into the protection and enhancement of the City's natural areas through the participation in environmental volunteer groups known as Friends Groups. Currently the City has 17 active Friends Groups working throughout on a variety of conservation projects. The City provides assistance to these groups through the provision of equipment, training and financial support.

The City of Joondalup recognises arts, culture and heritage as an important part of the character of the City and has a number of programs in place to represent the City's art, culture and heritage as well as providing community members with the opportunity to participate in such programs. The City provides a repertoire of art, culture and heritage programs and projects all year round to celebrate the diversity of the community and the heritage of Joondalup.
